# **Pulse Flows to Estuary**



A new pulse release to the Caloosahatchee Estuary begins on Apr 28. The Corps halted flow from S-79 (Franklin Lock) on Apr 17. They resumed pulse flows in late March & have maintained an average flow of 260 cfs. Pulse flows push salt water out of the estuary to maintain a proper

salinity balance.
