## November Dry and 2012 Warm



South FL had its driest November on record (only 0.3 inches, 1.5 below normal). With Lake O at 15ft (more than a foot above last year), the Corps continues to release much needed water to the Caloosahatchee estuary, averaging 800 cfs the past 2 weeks. ## Unhealthy Rivers in Florida





Shrinking flows caused by drought as well as rising demand for water by cities & industries have also contributed to the problems. ## Ta-Da! DEP Adopts BMAPS



Florida DEP announced adoption of two Basin Management Action Plans in Southwest FL, one for Hendry Creek & Imperial River and the other for the Caloosahatchee River (CR).
