

Army Surges Above 400cfs



The US Army Corps of Engineers has made serious efforts to increase flows to the Caloosahatchee Estuary. The average wet season flow is now 407cfs. This has stabilized salinity but not pushed it below the legal MFL goals for ecosystem health. [Sun-Sentinel] [Dry Season Flow Record]
