


#### Save the Water Date


#### **Environmental Brainstorming**



#### Oct 23 Red Tide





# Vigilance Always Required



Water managers sent Lake O water to the EAA for irrigation but cut back flow to the estuary. This resulted in higher estuary salinity levels. Expressions of concern by west coast stakeholders on the weekly science call resulted in SFWMD and COE sending more water to the estuary the following week.
